


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ADMISSION POLICY 2024-2025

Barpeta College shall follow this Admission Policy for the selection of students into different programmes offered for the Academic Year 2024-25

- For FYUGP i.e., B.A. 1st Semester admission: the entire process will be held ON-LY through the SAMARTH PORTAL i.e., Assam Higher Education Admission Portal (https://assamadmission.samarth.ac.in)
- For H.S. 1st Year admission: the entire process will be held ONLY through the DARPAN PORTAL (https://darpan.ahseconline.in)
- The details of all programmes along with the intakes and eligibility criteria are available in the prospectus.
- The College shall follow the Govt. of Assam reservation policy for the admission.

MANDATORY REQUIREMENT

- To start the admission process, the applicant needs to register and log in to the respective portal. Registration for admission is a one-time process and every applicant needs to register.
- Only certificate issued by the Circle Officer (competent revenue official) will be accepted for the purpose of granting Fee Waiver (if applicable) in admission from the upcoming academic session 2024 as per the relevant Govt. O.M.

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Principal's Message



Established in the year 1978 as Barpeta Girls' College with a mission to disseminate higher education among the girl students whose longing for higher education used to be obstructed by socio-economic barriers prevailing at that time, the college now opens a new chapter in its long glorious history with a new name 'BARPETA COLLEGE' that reflects its move to co-educational status. During the last forty five years, the college could show rays of hope to a large number of female students belonging to economically and socially disadvantaged families and localities, whose dreams of higher education wouldn't have come to be true, had this college not existed to open its door to them. But the fast-changing time now demands that, with a vast change in the socio-economic scenario, the college must also reinvent and reorganize itself, widening its horizon. That's the reason why the college which was established exclusively for girl students has now transformed itself, with consent from the public and a nod from the Government, to a co-educational institution with the name 'BARPETA COLLEGE'.

The change of name and status, of course, is not enough, because, after promulgation of the National Education Policy, 2020, the scope of higher education in India has widened to a great extent, and the college needs to fulfil all the requirements as the National Education Policy, 2020 expects from a higher educational institution. The college also keeps in mind that, though it is situated in an urban area, the college has been basically serving, and expects to serve in the coming days, the academic needs of the students from the rural, disadvantaged background, and therefore, the college has to prepare itself to cater to the changing academic needs of such students.

We are dedicated to our goal of making Barpeta College more vibrant, well-equipped and capable to keep pace with time.



How to apply for Admission at Barpeta College?

Interested candidates can check the prospectus online for eligibility and intake of each academic programme.

- Candidates need to register online at the specific portals to get Login-id and Password.
- Upon logging in with their credentials, candidates gain access to the applicant dashboard, providing them with a personalized platform to monitor their application status, modify their profile information, and upload necessary documents.
- In the "Uploads" section, candidates are prompted to submit relevant documents as indicated in their profile and other provided details. Please consider the instructions available in the portal. As soon as the profile details are completed and confirmed by the applicant, they will be able to select the programmes that are offered by the Barpeta College.
- To select the programme, click on Apply in College on the dashboard.

STEPS TO FOLLOW

- Step 1: Login using registered mobile number, date of birth, and 4-digit pin.
- Step 2: If login details are forgotten, use the "Forgot Login Details" option and recover the password using the registered mobile number.

- Step 4: After clicking on "Proceed to Next," a pop-up will be displayed with options to close, print, or proceed to the next step. Click on "Next" and then on "OK" to continue to the student Dashboard.
- Step 5: In the Dashboard, view the admission status, total number of applications submitted, and remaining applications.
- Step 6: To view colleges, click on the "Colleges" tab. Use the "Filter" option to choose the district as Barpeta and stream as Arts, or use the "Search" option to search for colleges globally.
- Step 7: After selecting Barpeta College or Barpeta Girls' College, click on "View Details" to see more information about the college. Click on "Apply" to proceed to the application page.
- Step 8: After applying, students can view their application status by clicking on the "My Applications" tab.
- Step 9: In the "My Applications" tab, students can also download their acknowledgement receipt.

- Preview the application form and make any necessary edits.
- Confirm and lock the application form.
- Select the desired programme from the list provided by the university. Select the Bhattadev University, affiliated college as Barpeta College or Barpeta Girls' College, programme level, scheme type, and programme.
- Check the declaration box regarding the information bulletin.
- Proceed to select course as FYUP i.e., B.A. 1st Semester according to the group mapped by the university/college to programmes.
- Provide academic details including qualification details of secondary and senior secondary education.
- Verify the "Other Details" section which is pre-filled according to the details entered during profile completion.
- Proceed to the confirmation page and verify all the entered details.
- Submit the application for the selected programme.

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INTRODUCING BARPETA



arpeta, nestled in the Barpeta district of Assam, India, serves as the administrative center of the region. Situated approximately 90 kilometers (56 miles) northwest of Guwahati, it stands as a prominent urban center in Western Assam. Recognized as the "Satra Nagari" or Temple Town of Assam, Barpeta boasts a rich heritage characterized by the presence of numerous Vaishnavite Satras.

Geographically, it rests at 26.32°N 91.0°E, with an average elevation of 35 meters (114 feet). Three rivers, namely Chaulkhowa, Mora Nodi

and Nakhanda—tributaries to the Brahmaputra—meander through the town. Notably, Barpeta lies 40 kilometers away from the renowned Manas National Park, a cherished sanctuary of Assam.

Historically, Barpeta was known as 'Tatikuchi', deriving its name from 'Tati', which signifies weaver, and 'Kuchi', referring to a cluster of villages in the local Barpetia dialect. In ancient times, it formed an integral part of the ancient Kamrup, specifically Kamapitha, within the larger Kamrup region. By the nineteenth century, Barpeta and its surrounding areas were incorporated into the Undivided Kamrup district as Barpeta subdivision. The year 1983 marked a significant milestone as the subdivision was accorded district status. Barpeta serves as the gateway to the illustrious Manas National Park, a cherished jewel among Assam's National Parks and a sanctuary housing one of India's few tiger reserves.









Satranagari Barpeta:

Several Satras, established revered saints such as Srimanta Sankardeva, Sri Sri Madhavdeva, and Sri Damodardeva, dot the landscape, embodying Assam's rich cultural heritage. Among these, Barpeta Satra, Sundaridiya Satra, and Pathaushi Satra stand out as mustvisit destinations. These Satras not only serve as centers of religious and spiritual learning but also showcase exquisite architecture and vibrant cultural performances. Visitors to these sacred sites are immersed in a world where tradition and devotion intertwine, offering a profound glimpse into Assam's spiritual legacy and artistic expression.

Doulotsav of Barpeta



Larting this session 2024-25, Barpeta Girls' College will be known as Barpeta College, now embracing co-education. Established on September 7th, 1978, in the heart of Barpeta Town, affectionately known as Satra Nagari and the headquarters of Barpeta District, it has been the sole higher education institution for women in the district. Initially led by prominent figures like Sri Nibaran Chandra Choudhury and Sri Jnanaranjan Das, the college has evolved under the guidance of various distinguished personalities serving as Presidents of the Governing Body and Principals. The college received government recognition for its HS and UG programs in 1984 and 1994 respectively. It transitioned to the deficit grants-in-aid system in 1998 and subsequently to the provincialized system in 2005, after which the college obtained UGC u/s 2(f) and 12(B) statuses on January 5th, 2007. Accredited by NAAC with a 'C' grade in its first cycle in 2003, the college achieved 'B' grade in its second cycle of the NAAC assessment and accreditation in 2016. Since the beginning, the college has been affiliated to Gauhati University, but from this session 2024-25, the college shifts its affiliation to Bhattadev University, Pathsala following the direction of the Government of Assam.

Barpeta College, presently an Arts stream institution with eight departments, offers education in English, Assamese, Education, Economics, Political Science, Philosophy, Anthropology, and Home Science, with plans to expand its academic sphere in future. Equipped with a modern computer lab, the college is gearing up to introduce computer education. Additionally, it serves as an active study center for Diploma, Bachelor's Degree, and Master's Degree programs through distance mode under Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU). The college community expresses gratitude to all who have contributed to its growth and envisions becoming a beacon of excellence with the continued support of the people of Barpeta and Assam.

Campus Facilities

1. GIRLS' HOSTEL:

To provide the residential facilities to the needy and meritorious students coming from remote and distant areas, the college has a Girls' Hostel with two separate buildings within the campus to accommodate around 100 students with suitable amenities, All the boarders have to follow the hostel instructions and the guidance of the Warden of the hostel. The hostel is equipped with modern facilities like:

- 24 hours water supply

2. LIBRARY:

The central library of the college is named as **Nibaran Chandra Choudhury Memorial Central Library**. The Central library is partially computerized. It has a collection of more than 15000 (fifteen thousand) books including text books, reference books and other collections. Moreover, the central library subscribes several national and state level monthly, fortnightly, quarterly journals and magazines in both vernacular and English languages to the taste of both the teachers and the students. In addition to these, the library has encyclopedias of several subjects.

Library hours: The library remains open from 9:30 AM to 5:00 PM on all working days.

3. CLASS ROOMS:

Utmost care has been taken to establish a conducive study atmosphere with well-appointed, pristine, and well-ventilated classrooms. Moreover, a number of classrooms are Wi-Fi enabled and well equipped with LCD power point projectors. The college has future plans to introduce smart classrooms.

4. STUDENTS' COMMON ROOM:

Separated common rooms for male and female students has been established, offering a space for relaxation and recreation during free periods. These are equipped with essential amenities including drinking water, restroom facilities, and recreational indoor games facilities.

5. LABS:

The college boasts well-equipped laboratories in departments such as Anthropology, Home Science, and Education. Additionally, there is a dedicated computer lab equipped with over 24 computers and high-speed internet connectivity. Furthermore, the college campus is equipped with Wi-Fi services, ensuring seamless connectivity for all.

6. COMPUTER EDUCATION:

The centre for computer education of the college was established in the year 2003 with a view to impart basic knowledge in computer application, The main objective of the centre is to acquaint the students with basic knowledge of computer so that they can be fit for computer related works. Interested students can access free education on the computer basics in the Computer Centre of the college. The college is planning to open various computer related courses in the coming days.

7. SEMINAR HALL & CONFERENCE ROOM:

The college has a modern and spacious Seminar Hall and Conference Room with multimedia facility for all functions. Sound proofing, installation of ceiling fan, LCD Power point projector etc. facilities are available in the conference Room.

8. COLLEGE CANTEEN:

The College has one well equipped canteen for students, teachers, and other employees where healthy and non-spicy food is provided. It is a pleasant hangout for interaction among all the members of the college.

9. COLLEGE MAGAZINE

Most of the departments publish wall magazines to offer opportunities for the development of the creative talent of the students. A college magazine is also released annually edited by the college magazine secretary and guided by the members of the magazine committee. This magazine basically emphasizes on literary flair & designing graphics of students in Assamese and English languages.

10. SPORTS FACILITY:

The college features both an indoor stadium and a playground, offering a range of sports facilities including badminton and volleyball. Students have access to these facilities to actively engage in sports and recreational activities.

11. ELECTRICITY AND POWER BACKUP

The electricity connection is available at the college campus. For the non-disruption of 24 hours electricity supply at campus, the college has also installed two digital generators.

12. WATER SUPPLY & DRINKING WATER

A continuous supply of safe drinking water is ensured within the college premises through the installation of appropriate Mineral RO Water Purifiers and Aqua guards. These facilities are strategically placed in key areas such as the Girls' Common Room, Office, and Hostel, guaranteeing round-the-clock access to clean and purified drinking water.

13. VIRTUAL COMMUNICATION (VC)

Barpeta Girls' College gives preference to virtual communication than conventional modes. Any kind of communication with the students has been made through SMS, WhatsApp and Facebook, teachers and nonteaching staffs are communicated either through SMS or WhatsApp or through e-mail. - 2. Admission will be on offline mode basis. However, all original documents have to be produced for verification on the day of Admission.
- 3. Only State and National level certificates will be entertained for the candidates claiming seats against Co-curricular category.
- 4. A candidate will have to produce the following at the time of admission.
 - a) A photocopy of the mark sheet of the last qualifying examination.
 - b) Caste certificate/ certificate for differently able / Gap certificate (court affidavit only), wherever applicable.
 - c) Current year income certificate obtaining from competent Circle Office only for Govt. Fee Waiver Scheme (if applicable).
- 5. Hostel seats will be allotted strictly on merit basis to the girls students only and as per Govt. Reservation Rules after admission.

Salient Features of FYUGP

Introduction:

The university grants commission (UGC) has initiated several measures to bring equity, efficiency and excellence in the higher education system of country. The important measures taken to enhance academic standards and quality in higher education include innovation and improvements in curriculum, teaching-learning process, examination and evaluation systems, besides governance and other matters. But due to the variuous diversities present in the system of higher education, there are multiple approaches followed by universities towards examination, evaluation and grading system. However, the academic reforms recommended by the UGC in the recent past have led to overall improvement in the higher education system. On the basis of the recommendation, apart from the flexibility and freedom in designing

The examination, there is a need to devise a sensible system for awarding the grades based on the performance of students. the NEP2020 based Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP), being adopted by bhattadev university, is an 8-semester (4-year) programme of 160 credits with multiple exit and entry options at the successful completion of courses assigned at the end of each year.

- Students who opt to exit after completion of the first year and have secured 40 credits will be awarded a certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the first year.
- Students who opt to exit after completion of the second year and have secured 80 credits will be awarded the diploma if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the second year.
- Students who opt to exit after completion of the third year and have secured

120 credits will be eligible for the bachelor degree in the major discipline without honours.

- Students after completion of the fourth year and have secured 160 credits will be eligible for the bachelor degree with honours in the major discipline.
- Students are allowed to re-enter the degree programme within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

Outline of Courses:

The broad categories of courses and minimum credits required for the 4-year Honours degrees as per the UGC document are as follows:

- 1. Major (Core) course/paper: 80 credits
- 2. Minor course/paper: 32 credits
- 3. Interdisciplinary course/paper (IDC): 9 credits
- 4. Ability Enhancement Course/paper (AEC): 8 credits
- 5. Skill Enhancement Course/paper (SEC): 9 credits
- 6. Value Added Course/paper (VAC): 8 credits
- 7. Summer Internship: 2 credits
- 8. Research Project/ Dissertation: 12 credits (for Honours with Research degree)

The following points may be noted:

- In lieu of the Research Project, a student may study 3 courses each of 4 credits (i.e. total 12 credits), leading to an Honours degree (without Research).
- For the 4-year Honours degrees the Major subject/ discipline requires 80 credits and the . Minor subject/ discipline requires 32 credits.
- For a Double Major, the minimum credit requirements are 48 (3-year degree) and 60 (4- year Honours degree) respectively in a subject/ discipline other than the original Major.
- In the UGC framework, papers in Major and Minor disciplines are categorized into levels of 100, 200, 300 and 400. Therefore, a course (paper) offered by a Department, say with 4 credits and of level 200, may be taken both as a Major (Core) course by one student and as a Minor course by another student having a different Major discipline, possibly in different semesters.

Definitions of Keywords:

In FYUGP the terminologies those are relevant to the UG curricula have been briefly described below.

Academic Year: Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.

Semester: Each semester will consist of 15 weeks of regular academic work. The odd semester may be scheduled from July to December and even semester from January to June under normal circumstance.

Programme: An educational programme leading to award of a Certificate, Diploma or Degree (B.Sc., B.A., etc.)

Discipline: This means a particular subject.

Course: Each programme is equipped with a number courses of various disciplines/subjects. The course of a particular discipline/subject refers to the content of the papers the students have to study in that discipline/subject required in obtaining a degree. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures /tutorials/laboratory work/ field work/outreach activities/project work /seminars /assignments / presentations etc. or a combination of any of these.

Honours: A particular discipline/subject that a student opts as major subject. (e.g. honours in Physics)

Core Course (CC): A discipline/subject specific compulsory basic course.

Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): A course designed by a department for enhancement of skill of the students in a particular discipline/subject.

Minor Course (M): A course in a discipline/subject corresponding to a subject other than the major subject.

Value Added Course (VAC): Value-based education to include managment of biological resources and biodiversity for the development of humanistic, ethical, sustainable development and living, constitutional, and universal human values of truth, righteous conduct, peace, love, nonviolence, scientific temper, citizenship values, and life skills.

Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC): These are compulsory courses. For science programme there will be two of them. AECC-1 is Communicative English & AECC-2 is Environmental Science.

Credit: A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. Theory/Tutorial classes: 1 credit = 1 hour / week and Practical classes: 1 credit = 2 hours / week

Credit Point: It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.

Letter Grade: It is an index of the performance of students in a said course.

Grade Point: It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a certain point scale. The following table explains the above two points

Vocational Course (VOC): A vocational course is focused on practical work, preparing students for a particular trade or skilled profession. These courses are best for students who have a good idea of their career path and want to gain the knowledge to get there.

Levels of Courses:

100 - 199: Foundation or introductory courses.

200 - 299: Intermediate level courses.

300 - 399: Higher level courses.

400 - 499 : Advanced courses.

Credit: A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. Theory/Tutorial classes: 1 credit = 1 hour / week and Practical classes: 1 credit = 2 hours / week

Credit Point: It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): It is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places. If C_i = credit point in the *i*th course/paper and G_i = grade point obtained by a student in the *i*th course/paper then the grade point average in the *i*th Semeter ie SGPA is given by $S_i = \sum C_i G_i / \sum C_i$

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): It is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses in all semesters and the sum of the total credits of all courses in all the semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places. If S_i = Semester Grade point average in the *i*th Semeter, S = total number of semesters in the program, then the cumulative grade point average ie CGPA scored by the student is given by $C = \Sigma S_i / S$

Grade Sheet/Report: Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA earned till that semester.

In order to improve the writing and oral skills of learners, the program caters to ensuring that learners become effective, clear communicators in written and oral work and are capable of explaining complex issues in accessible terms.



Uniform Dress Code:

It is mandatory for all the students to maintain the uniform dress code at any time while staying inside the college premises. No student without donning the uniform prescribed by the college will be allowed to attend classes, examinations and any other activities inside the college campus including works in the college office. At the time of representing the college outside, the students have to wear the college uniform.

Identity Card

Each regular student of the college will be issued an identity card duly signed by the principal. At the time of staying inside the college campus, it is mandatory for all the students to keep the identity card hanging from the neck so that it can be easily visible to anybody.

General Rules:

- 1. Every student and all intra- institutional bodies of the college shall abide by the general rules and guidance framed by the college authority from time to time.

- 5. Only the recognised body shall have the privilege to use the college premises after obtaining formal permission from the principal.
- 6. No notice or leaflet can be circulated anywhere in the college premises without prior permission from the principal.
- 7. Admission fees and all other fees are to be paid for the whole year at the time of admission.
- 8. Each academic session will run as per academic calendar embodied here.
- 9. Wearing of College uniform is compulsory during college hours on all working days including college festivals organised in the college.
- 10. To keep the college campus, clean every student shall maintain hygienic environment.

Library rules:

- 1. 03 (Three) books can be borrowed at a time by a student (Honours & regular)
- 2. Only text books are issued.
- 3. Reference books are not issued.
- 4. Books are issued from 11:00 to 3:00 PM depending on their availability.
- 5. The borrower must return the books within 15 days. Otherwise Rs. 5/will be levied for each day for the next 15 days and Rs. 2/- for each day thereafter against each book.

- 8. Books lost, defaced or torn in any way shall have to be replaced by the borrower. If failed, twice the market value of the same has to be paid by the borrower.


Important Rules & Regulations:

Hostel Rules:

- 1. Only bona-fide students will be allowed to stay in the hostel.
- 2. The student willing to get accommodated in the hostel has to pay the hostel admission fees at the time of hostel admission, if selected, without which she will not get admitted to the hostel.
- 3. Admission shall be granted for one year only. An existing boarder must renew her admission annually paying required fees without which she will forfeit her seat in the hostel.
- 4. Period for which hostel admission is given to a student: -
- 5. For HS Class -- June to May
- 6. For UG Class -- August to July
- 7. Students for admission to hostel will be selected on the basis of merit and distance from residence.
- 8. Only a female family member of a boarder will be allowed to stay as guest with the boarder for 24 hours only, that too, only in case of urgent need, and the same will be recorded by the hostel monitor.
- 9. No boarder will be allowed to go out of the campus without permission of the hostel warden.
- 10. On written request of the parents/local guardian of a boarder, the hostel warden may allow her to go home after properly recording her departure.
- 11. A hostel boarder must keep her room and its surrounding neat and clean. She should handle the hostel property carefully and in case of any dam-

- age, she will have to pay the compensation against such damage as fixed by the authority.
- 12. Gossiping, loud voice/music etc. and other activities that disturb the academic environment in the hostel are strictly prohibited during study hours as fixed by the hostel management committee.
- 13. Visitors will be allowed to meet a boarder only on Sundays subject to the permission of the warden.

Annexure 2: UGC Regulation on Ragging

UGC REGULATIONS ON CURBING THE MENACE OF RAGGING IN HIGHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, 2009

In exercise of the powers conferred by clause (g) of Sub-Section (1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission, hereby, makes the following Regulations, namely-

Title, commencement and applicability:-

- These regulations shall be called the "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009".
- 2. They shall come into force with immediate effect.
- 3. They shall apply to all the Universities established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act or a State Act, to all Institutions deemed to be University under Section 3 of UGC Act, 1956, to all other higher Educational Institutions, Including the departments, constituent units and all the premises (academic, residential, sports, canteen, etc.) of such Universities, deemed University and other Higher Educational Institutions, whether located within the campus or outside, and to all means of transportation of students whether public or private.

Objective:-

To root out raging in all its forms from Universities, Colleges and other educational institutions in the country by prohibiting it by law, preventing its occurrence by following the provision of these regulations and punishing those who indulge in ragging as provided for in these regulations and the appropriate law in force.

"Ragging" means the following:

Any conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise rear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.

Punishable ingredients or Ragging:-

- · Abetment to ragging;
- · Criminal conspiracy to ragging;
- · Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging;
- · Public nuisance created during ragging;
- · Violation of decency and morals through ragging;
- · Injury to body, causing hurt or grievous hurt;
- · Wrongful restraint;
- · Wrongful confinement;
- · Use of criminal force:
- Assault as well as sexual offences or unnatural offences;
- Extortion:
- Criminal trespass;
- · Offences against property;
- · Criminal intimidation;
- Attempts to commit any or all of the above mentioned offences against the victim (s);
- · Physical or psychological humiliation;
- · All other offences following from the definition of "Ragging".

Punishments:-

At the institution level:-

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution, the possible punishments for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one or any combination of the following:

- Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- Withholding/Withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
- · Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
- Withholding results.
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, National or International meet, tournament, Youth festival, etc.
- Suspension/ Expulsion from the hostel.
- · Cancellation of Admission.
- Rustication from the Institution for period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters.
- Expulsion from the Institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for specified period.
- Fine ranging between Rupees 25,000/- and Rupees 1 Lakh.
- Collective punishment: when the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.
